JANUARY 2019 ANNUAL MEETING INFORMATION

Your meeting registration form is attached, please complete and return to me with your check at your earliest convenience. Remember to complete the information on the back for the White Labs tour. The number of participants will determine the size bus we require. Please return your registration form and check to me no later than December 19, 2018.

The 2019 annual meeting will be held at The Bay Club Hotel and Marina, 2131 Shelter Island Drive, San Diego, CA 92106. A contract was signed and a block of twenty (20) rooms secured and the required deposit of \$1,500,00 made to secure our room rates. The meeting will be held **Wednesday, January 23 through Friday, January 25, 2019** (i.e., the week of the Martin Luther King holiday).

Daily room rates negotiated for single or double are:

- \$139.00 plus 12.5% occupancy tax (\$17.38) = \$156.38 per night. The group rate will be honored for three days pre and three days post conference stays.
- Other available rates \$149.00 triple, \$159.00 quad, \$229.00 suite plus the 12.5% occupancy tax.

UPDATE ON 2019 MEETING AND TOUR INFORMATON BY BARBARA DAWSON, PROGRAM CHAIR AND YPSW PRESIDENT-ELECT

<u>Meeting</u>: The theme of this year's meeting is Total Worker Exposure and we will focus on current challenges facing the industrial hygienist as the profession continues to evolve. Speakers will discuss cumulative risk from multiple exposures both to different agents as well as to exposures on- and off-the job. We'll learn more about sensor technology and the issues associated with how to manage all of the data that are generated. We'll explore the intersection between worker exposure and worker health and discuss the role of the industrial hygienist in all of these areas.

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Technical Tour: This year's technical tour is a visit to White Labs, a name familiar to home brew aficionados. White Labs is the primary supplier of fermentation products to both hobbyists and commercial brewers. They started as home brewers looking for higher quality yeast and have grown into a team of biochemists exploring new ways to advance brewing. The mission of White Labs is "to stretch the limits of science in order to set new standards in purity and freshness." We will tour their production facilities and learn about their programs to protect the health and safety of their employees. Following the tour, we'll visit their tasting room and sample some of their products!
